Irish Cancer Society Cancer Research Seed Funding Award 2024

The Irish Cancer Society is inviting applications for the Cancer Research Seed Funding Award 2024. This award offers researchers the chance to initiate projects that are both competitive and impactful, supporting activities that may not have been possible without seed funding. Application are open to cancer researchers from all backgrounds, including academic and clinical researcher (post-undergraduate level). The deadline for submissions is 3pm on Thursday, 22nd August 202₄ Up to €75,000 is available per project, with a duration of 12 to 24 months. There are two awards available: one for a Survivorship research project and another for a Translational-CAYA research project, focused on Children, Adolescents, or Young Adults. Detailed eligibility criteria and application guidelines are available on the grant website, and applications can be submitted through the Irish Cancer Society Gateway Grant Tracker online system. Analysis Reveals Uniy Une-Inira of Snifts Have Adequate Nursing Staff



Full Report Here The Royal College of Nursing (RCN) has highlighted severe workforce shortages in hospital and community services, revealing that only a third of shifts have adequate registered nurse coverage. The latest 'Last Shift' survey, conducted with over 11,000 nursing staff, indicates that many shifts are critically understaffed, with some missing up to half of the planned number of nurses. This shortage is leading to unsafe patient care, with nurses often responsible for excessive numbers of patients and inadequate support. The RCN is calling for legally enforceable nurse-patient ratios to ensure safe staffing levels and prevent further harm to patients. For more details, see the RCN's full report.

Compassionate Communities in Palliative and End of Life Care Conference

The Compassionate Communities in Palliative and End of Life Care Conference will take place o Monday, 9 September 2024, from 09:30 to 16:00 at the Canal Court Hotel in Newry, Northern Ireland. This conference, coinciding with the start of Palliative Care Week 2024, aims to foster a compassionate community response to palliative care needs, end-of-life issues, and bereavement. It will address the challenges people face when dealing with dying, death, and loss highlight successful community initiatives, and explore ways to create more equitable compassionate communities. The event, hosted by the All Ireland Institute of Hospice and Palliative Care in collaboration with Foyle Hospice and the Irish Hospice Foundation, invites community groups, civic society organizations, individuals with life-limiting conditions, family carers, and the public from across Ireland. Keynote speakers include Prof. Allan Kellehear and Micheál Martin T.D. Additionally, the conference calls for submissions of exemplar community projects that support those facing life-limiting conditions or grief. Submissions are due by 5pm or Monday, 19 August. PhD Opportunity

A fully-funded PhD opportunity in the ethics of palliative care is available under the supervision of Professor Linda Hogan. This position is part of an interdisciplinary Trinity Research Doctorate Group-based Award, with four funded PhD positions focusing on Decision-Making for People with Advanced Illness in Palliative Care. The program addresses challenges in clinical decision-making, patient-family caregiver relations, and the legislative and ethical aspects of shared decision-making.

The research will explore how patients' care preferences are influenced by family caregivers, healthcare professionals' decisions on symptom management, the impact of Ireland's 'Assisted Decision-Making (Capacity) Act' on patient autonomy, and other key ethical considerations in palliative care. The ideal candidates will have backgrounds in medical ethics, ethics, social sciences, health research, or related fields, and will employ primarily qualitative methods. <u>**Updated Guidelines**</u>

The National Cancer Control Programme have updated the 'National Clinical Guideline: Diagnosi and staging of patients with prostate cancer' based on the implementation of recommendation (3.6.1) to include "very high risk" patients. The Guideline Development Group recommend that PSMA PET-CT should be considered for primary staging in high risk and very high risk prostate cancer patients who are suitable for definitive treatment.
