On February 11, 2025, the Irish Association for Palliative Care (IAPC) hosted its highly successful 24th Education & Research Seminar, bringing together clinicians, researchers and healthcare professionals from across Ireland. Themed "Integration and Innovation Across the Lifespan," the seminar provided an invaluable platform to discuss groundbreaking research, clinical advancements, and best practices in palliative care. Th event began with a warm welcome from Dr. Esther Beck, Chairperson of the IAPC, and Dr. Thomas Cahill, Vice Chair of the Education and Research Forum. They emphasised the importance of collaboration, research, and education in shaping the future of palliative care, especially in light of new policy developments and the increasing need for innovative, patient-centred care across Ireland.

## **Platform Presentations**

The seminar featured eleven platform presentations, each offering valuable insights into emerging trends and challenges in palliative care. Research topics ranged from clinical treatments and symptom management to the experiences of healthcare professionals and interdisciplinary collaboration.





The latest research presentations in palliative care showcased a diverse range of studies aimed at enhancing symptom management, improving healthcare practices, and fostering interdisciplinary collaboration. Researchers explored innovative approaches to patien comfort, including the use of High-Flow Nasal Therapy t manage breathlessness, highlighting its potential to improve respiratory symptoms and overall well-being. Financial aspects of end-of-life care were also examined shedding light on the costs associated with both formal and informal caregiving. The importance of nonpharmacological interventions was emphasised through an Occupational Therapy-led breathlessness management program, demonstrating how structured interventions can positively impact patients' quality of life Additionally, the role of prophylactic antibiotics for patients receiving corticosteroids was assessed, investigating their potential to reduce infection risks in palliative care settings.

Interdisciplinary collaboration emerged as a central theme across multiple presentations, showcasing the benefits of cross-specialty teamwork in palliative care. A case study demonstrated how partnerships between Speech and Language Therapists and Occupational Therapists supported a young adult with a rare neurodegenerative disorder, illustrating the role of tailored interventions in improving communication and daily function. A Quality Improvement initiative focused on refining PRN medication prescribing for oncology patients, aiming to reduce prescription errors and enhance patient safety. Global trends in the treatment of





Chronic Kidney Disease-associated Pruritus were also explored, identifying key preferences and emerging second-line therapy options.

The evolving role of palliative care key workers was another important discussion point, with a study calling for greater clarity and standardisation in their responsibilities and coordination efforts. As palliative care continues to adapt to the complex needs of patients and their families, these research findings underscore the necessity of a holistic, patient-centered approach that integrates medical, psychological, and social support. The presentations reinforced the importance of innovation, collaboration, and ongoing education in ensuring that palliative care services continue to evolve and meet the needs of those at the end of life.







Each presentation was followed by interactive Q&A sessions, fostering discussions that highlighted the real-world impact of this research on patient care and healthcare policy.

## **Plenary Speaker**



A major highlight of the day was the plenary lecture by Dr. Feargal Twomey, titled "The Most Dangerous Phrase in the Language." Dr. Twomey challenged attendees to question assumptions and traditional practices in palliative care, advocating for innovation, adaptability, and evidence-based decision-making. His compelling ta resonated with the audience, sparking meaningful discussions on how the field can continue evolving to meet the needs of patients and families.

## **Poster Presentations**

Alongside the platform presentations, the poster exhibition featured over 60 research projects, covering a broad spectrum of case studies, audits, quality improvement initiatives, and clinical research. Topics included medication safety, symptom management, interdisciplinary collaboration, and innovations in palliative care delivery.

Some notable posters examined diabetes management at the end of life, deprescribing practices, and the impact of blood transfusions on fatigue and breathlessness. Others focused on improving communication between palliative care teams and general practitioners, enhancing transitions of care, and exploring the experience of family caregivers supporting loved ones with Motor Neurone Disease. Quality improvement initiatives also played a prominent role, with studies evaluating the effectiveness of hospital discharge processes, specialist palliative care resources, and strategies for reducing emergency hospital admissions for palliative patients.

The poster session provided attendees with an opportunity to engage directly with researchers, exchange ideas, and discuss potential applications of these findings in clinical practice.


